- **Active Drop Pool Cases:** Drop often to gamers currently using main servers. Because supply is high, these cases normally cost just a few cents.
- **Uncommon Drop Pool Cases:** No longer drop regularly after matches. As gamers continue to open them, the total supply decreases. According to basic economic principles, as supply decreases while need stays consistent or increases, the price of these stopped cases skyrockets.

With the shift from CS: GO to CS2, the visual fidelity of weapon finishes altered dramatically. Skins that looked average in CS: GO often acquired immense shine, depth, and popularity in the Source 2 engine, triggering unforeseen spikes in the costs of both particular skins and the older cases that include them.
