- **Prevent Third-Party Gambling Sites:** Many external sites provide simulated case openings, upgrade minigames, or roulette wheels utilizing CS skins. A number of these websites operate in legal gray locations, have rigged odds, and posture an extreme danger of account theft or frauds. Stay with the official in-game customer.
