

A leaking sink may or may not be an emergency, and sewer camera inspection standards help determine severity. How Do Inspection Standards Define When a Leak Requires Emergency Action?

Sewer camera inspection operates under established NASSCO MAWasc (Manhole and Sewer Cleaning Standards Committee) grading scales that classify defects from 1 to 5. A Grade 1 defect—minor deposit or debris—typically does not warrant emergency response. A Grade 3 or higher, indicating structural damage, root intrusion, or significant joint separation, often does. When we deploy a camera into your drainpipe to inspect the source of a leak, we measure the slope of the pipe, document the exact location and size of the defect, and assign it a standardized grade. This documented finding tells us whether your leaking sink is a contained plumbing fixture issue or a sign of deeper sewer line compromise that could affect your entire home's drainage system.

What Does a Measured Slope Reading Tell Us About Sink Leak Severity?

Proper drainage depends on precise slope—typically 1/4 inch of drop per 1 foot of horizontal run. When we perform a sewer camera inspection, our equipment records the exact pitch of your drain line as it moves through the pipe. If the slope is compromised, water pools in the line, backing up into fixtures or encouraging bacterial growth and corrosion. A leaking sink coupled with improper measured slope often signals that the leak is not isolated to the fixture but is part of a systemic drainage problem. This distinction is critical: if only the sink trap is loose, it's a same-day repair. If the inspection reveals slope failure or joint separation beneath the sink, emergency response prevents water damage to your home's foundation and walls.

How Do Documented Defect Locations Guide Emergency Plumber Response Speed?
