The Anatomy of Opening a Case

To open a CS2 case, a gamer needs two things: the case itself and a **Container Key**. Keys are offered uniformly in-game by Valve for a flat rate of £ 2.50 GBP (or regional equivalent).

Once a key is used on a case, a roulette-style wheel spins through the possible weapon skins included within that particular drop. The item the wheel stops on is permanently included to the gamer's inventory.

What are the Odds?

Valve does not explicitly publish the precise odds in-game for every single region due to differing local gambling laws, however comprehensive neighborhood information tracking thousands of openings has revealed reputable estimates for drop rarity.

1. **The Active Drop Pool:** These cases drop frequently to players finishing matches and earning weekly care bundles.
2. **The Rare (Discontinued) Pool:** When a new case is presented or an operation ends, older cases are moved to the uncommon pool. They no longer drop frequently after matches, though gamers still have an incredibly little chance (approximated at under 1%) of getting one as a bonus drop. Since their supply is limited, unusual cases frequently value in value gradually.

Popular CS2 Cases to Watch

With dozens of cases launched over the life-span of CS: GO and CS2, particular collections stick out due to their renowned skins or high-tier knives.
