2. Weapon Rarities

Skins are classified into various rarity tiers, which dictate their drop rates in-game or from weapon cases:

Rarity Tier Color Code Description **Consumer Grade** White Common, standard weapon finishes. **Industrial Grade** Light Blue Slightly uncommon drops. **Mil-Spec** Dark Blue Basic tier discovered in the majority of weapon cases. **Restricted** Purple Higher-tier items, frequently working as trade-up food. **Categorized** Pink Rare, extremely popular weapon finishes. **Covert** Red The greatest standard weapon tier in cases (omitting knives/gloves). **Extraordinary** Gold Very rare products, consisting of Knives and Gloves.

Float Values and Pattern Indices

- **Pattern Index:** Many skins include procedural generation, suggesting the texture is mapped differently depending on a seed number (1 to 1000). Famous examples include the *Case Hardened* series, where particular seed numbers develop huge quantities of blue on the weapon surface area ("Blue Gems"), driving prices up exponentially.

How to Acquire CS2 Skins

- **Use Steam Guard:** Always have two-factor authentication enabled by means of the Steam Mobile Authenticator.

- **Research study before buying:** Check historical pricing trends on community databases before buying costly products.
