

Navigating the Titration Process in UK Psychiatry: A Comprehensive Guide

What to Expect During Titration

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1. Standard Assessment and Baseline Vitals

2. The Starting Dose

3. Regular Check-ins and Monitoring

4. Dosage Adjustments

Common Challenges During Titration
