- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Extremely worn, sometimes amusing or unique look)

StatTrak™ Items

Any weapon unpacked has a roughly **10% possibility** of being a StatTrak™ variant. These items include a small LED screen embedded on the weapon that tracks the variety of validated eliminates made by the gamer using that particular gun. Usually, <https://cs2skin.com/cases> StatTrak™ weapons command a greater rate on the market, though exceptions exist for specific high-tier collector knives.
