overlays and close unnecessary background applications. **DirectX/ Vulkan** API error pop-ups Incompatible rendering API setting Change launch alternatives or alter the primary video settings in-game.

Quick Troubleshooting Checklist

If players are experiencing persistent crashes, going through this systematic checklist can save hours of frustration:

- **Verify Game Files:** Right-click the game in Steam > > Properties > Installed Files > > *Verify stability of game files*.
- **Update Everything:** Ensure Windows, your graphics card software application, and Steam are all running the most recent steady variations.
- **Check Temperatures:** Use keeping track of software (like MSI Afterburner) to make sure overheating parts aren't activating safety shutdowns.
- **Release Options:** Clear out outdated launch options that might have operated in tradition CS: GO but conflict with the Source 2 engine in CS2.
