Vital Tools for the Job

Fixing a Sagging Door

A sagging door typically rubs against the frame or declines to latch correctly.

1. **Examine the hinges:** Open the door and look for loose screws. Tighten any loose screws. If the screw holes are stripped, replace the brief screws with longer ones (3-inch screws) that bite deep into the framing stud.
2. **Shim the hinges:** If tightening screws stops working, position a small piece of cardboard, folded paper, or an industrial hinge shim behind the loose leaf of the hinge to modify the door's angle.

Eliminating Door Drafts (Weatherstripping Replacement)

If light or air seeps around the edges of an exterior door, the weatherstripping has likely flattened or torn.

1. Eliminate the old weatherstripping by pulling it out of its channel.
2. Clean the channel completely.
3. Measure and cut brand-new weatherstripping (foam tape, V-strip, or interlocking metal) to fit the top and sides of the door frame.
4. Protect the new product according to the producer's instructions.

Fixing Windows

Windows have more moving parts than doors, consisting of sashes, tracks, balances, and locks.

Fixing a Stuck Window

Painted-shut windows or distorted sashes prevail in older homes.

1. **Break the paint seal:** Run an utility knife thoroughly along the joint where the sash meets the frame, both inside and outside.
2. **Lube the tracks:** Apply a silicone-based spray lubricant to the tracks or sheaves. Prevent petroleum-based lubricants, which attract dirt and dust.
3. **Pry carefully:** Use a stiff putty knife to carefully wedge in between the sash and frame, working your way around the perimeter till it breaks totally free.

Changing Window Glass

For single-pane windows with split glass:

1. **Safety first:** Wear heavy gloves and protective glasses. Tape the broken glass with an 'X' shape to reduce shattering.

2. **Eliminate old glass and glazing:** Pry out the damaged shards. Utilize a sculpt or heat gun to soften and remove the old putty (glazing substance) and metal glazing points.
3. **Prep the rabbit:** Apply a thin layer of fresh glazing substance to the wood rabbet (the recess where the glass sits).
4. **Install the new glass:** Press the new glass pane strongly into location. Protect it with new glazing points pushed into the wood every 6 to 8 inches.
5. **Use brand-new putty:** Roll a rope of glazing compound between your hands, press it into the joint, and smooth it at a 45-degree angle with a putty knife. Let it cure and paint it to match.

3. **Use Backer Rod (if required):** For spaces deeper than 1/4 inch, insert foam backer rod to save money on caulk and provide a strong foundation.
4. **Cut the Nozzle:** Cut the idea of the silicone outside caulk tube at a 45-degree angle to match the desired bead size.
5. **Use Caulk:** Hold the caulking gun at a 45-degree angle and pull it efficiently along the joint, keeping constant pressure.
6. **Smooth the Bead:** Run a damp gloved finger or a caulking tool over the bead to push it into the gap and create a tidy, concave finish.
