

Bayport sits on the South Shore of Long Island with a kind of quiet confidence that visitors notice almost immediately. It is not a place that performs for outsiders. The village and surrounding hamlet feel lived in, cared for, and shaped by the steady routines of people who know the value of a harbor breeze, a walkable neighborhood, and a good cup of coffee after a morning near the water.
