

What pregnant mares need nutritionally

Expecting mares have shifting needs throughout **the pregnancy period**, and the proper feeding plan should maintain mare health without causing unnecessary weight gain. The goal is a **balanced ration** that delivers **adequate calories, high-quality protein**, and the proper **micronutrients** for both the mare and the developing foal.

Most of the early pregnancy diet should still be built around **forage**, especially quality **hay** and access to **pasture** when available. A roughage-first approach promotes digestion and helps keep the digestive tract working properly. In many cases, forage can meet a large share of the mare's needs until the later stages of pregnancy, but the exact plan depends on **body condition score**, forage quality, and the mare's workload.
