Wear Condition Float Value Range Visual Description **Factory New (FN)** 0.00-- 0.07 Pristine condition with little to no scratches or fading. Normally the most pricey. **Very Little Wear (MW)** 0.07-- 0.15 Really light wear, typically only noticeable upon close assessment. **Field-Tested (FEET)** 0.15-- 0.38 Obvious scratches and use on prominent edges, however the artwork stays largely intact. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.45 Significant wear, heavy

scratching, and obvious fading of colors. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Very used, rusted, or heavily faded. Often demanded for special "black-grind" results.

The Economy: Cases, Markets, and Trading

The CS: GO skin economy operates just like a real-world stock exchange. Rates change based upon supply and need, esports occasions, video game updates, and community sentiment.

How Players Acquire Skins

- **Random Drops:** Players get random weapon drops or cases simply by using authorities or neighborhood servers.
- **Opening Cases:** Players can buy or earn keys to open weapon cases. However, the odds of unboxing unusual products (like knives) are notoriously low (approx. 0.26%).

- **M4A4|Howl:** The only weapon skin categorized with the "Contraband" rarity. It was eliminated from official drops years ago due to copyright issues regarding its art work, making existing copies extremely uncommon.
- **The Asimov Series:** Instantly recognizable by its futuristic, sci-fi orange-and-white aesthetic, covering the AWP, M4A4, and P250.
