



A car crash does not need to be dramatic to leave someone dealing with whiplash. In practice, many of the patients who seek care after a rear-end collision describe the same surprise: the vehicle damage looked minor, adrenaline carried them through the rest of the day, and then the neck stiffness set in. Sometimes it starts as a dull ache at the base of the skull. Sometimes it shows up the next morning as pain turning the head while backing out of the driveway. Patients often ask about heat versus ice. Both can be reasonable depending on the stage and personal response. Ice may feel better in the very acute period if there is a strong inflammatory feel to the area. Heat often helps once muscle guarding and stiffness are the dominant complaints. Neither replaces therapy, but either can make symptoms more manageable.

How treatment usually progresses

Whiplash recovery tends to move through phases rather than a straight line.
