

Washington, Illinois has a habit of surprising people. On a map, it can look like one more Central Illinois community tucked into the landscape east of Peoria. Spend any real time there, though, and the town starts revealing its own character, the kind built from school events, park weekends, church suppers, historic roots, and the steady work of homeowners who keep older houses and newer subdivisions in good shape through all four seasons.
