- **Wear and Tear (Float Value):** Each weapon has a "float worth" from 0.00 to 1.00. Specific skins look significantly different (and typically much better) when they are Factory New, making flawless versions exceptionally rare and pricey.
- **Pro Player Popularity:** If a popular esports professional utilizes a specific skin throughout a Major tournament, demand for that skin typically skyrockets over night.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can sell ten skins of the very same rarity for one skin of the next greater tier, developing a steady demand for lower-tier items.

- **Operation Bravo Case:** Released throughout the video game's first main operation, it introduced iconic community-designed skins and remains a significant status symbol for collectors.
- **Prisma and Dreams & Nightmares Cases:** These modern cases highlight the incredible artistry of community creators, featuring dynamic, extremely in-depth designs that attract more youthful players and collectors alike.
