

Why ants show up in Hamilton kitchens

If you are dealing with kitchen ants in Hamilton, Ontario, you are not alone. An ant infestation often begins because foraging ants have found a reliable food source, moisture, or simple entry gaps into your home. In Hamilton homes, especially older homes and century houses, tiny cracks around kitchens can give ants access via baseboards, windowsills, and utility penetrations. Newer builds are not immune either, and even modern construction can have small entry points around trim, flooring, and cabinets.

The most common invaders in local kitchens are odorous house ants and pavement ants, though pharaoh ants and even carpenter ants can appear indoors under the right conditions. What attracts

Ants in the kitchen are usually attracted by a combination of available food and water. Typical attractants are food crumbs under appliances, sugar spills on counters, and pet food bowls left out for long periods. Minor bits of jam, juice, or cereal can support ant activity because ants are good at detecting and sharing resources within the colony.

Moisture sources are just as important. Leaky taps, condensation around pipes, damp dishcloths, and standing water in sinks or trays can draw ants into the kitchen. Pay close attention to baseboards, under sinks, and where counters meet walls. If ants are coming in from the outside, exterior caulking gaps and basic exclusion work can make a major difference.

Try to avoid heavy-handed sprays inside the kitchen, especially near food. Some all-natural repellents may serve to reduce activity temporarily, but they usually do not resolve the problem on their own. A food-safe approach is best: clean scent trails, use baiting strategically, and remove anything that keeps attracting the colony.

Whenever home remedies are not enough

Why are ants keep coming back after I clean my kitchen?
