Valve's Stance and Regulatory Crackdowns

- **The 2016 Cease-and-Desist Era:** Valve sent formal notifications to dozens of popular skin gambling sites, demanding they shut down operations as they broke the Steam Subscriber Agreement.
- **Trade Hold Updates:** To curb immediate trading and cash laundering, Valve introduced a necessary 7-day trade hold on any traded skin. While this momentarily disrupted the gambling market, operators quickly adapted utilizing P2P systems and crypto cash-outs.
- **Legal Scrutiny:** Governments worldwide have begun taking notification. Class-action suits, federal government examinations, and statutory bans in different countries have actually forced operators to constantly move domains and legal structures.
