Keep in mind: Within each tier, there is an extra random roll for the item's "Float Value" (wear condition, ranging from Factory New to Battle-Scarred) and a prospective opportunity (approx. 10%) for a StatTrak variation, which tracks kills.

The Economics of the Steam Market

To genuinely understand case openings, one should take a look at the Steam Community Market. It is a fully functioning micro-economy governed by the laws of supply and need.

When a player opens a case, the products they get rarely equal the £ 2.50 spent on the secret. In reality, the vast bulk of drops-- especially the common "Blue" tier products-- cost mere cents on the marketplace. - **Set a Strict Budget:** Decide ahead of time how much money you are willing to spend (e.g., £ 20 a month) and treat it strictly as home entertainment expenses-- similar to going to a movie or purchasing a lottery ticket.
