

Fort Worth has always had its own rhythm. It is a city where old housing stock sits a few streets away from newer subdivisions, where some owners inherit homes they never planned to keep, and where a property can look perfectly livable on paper but still be a headache to sell the traditional way. Cash buyers also tend to be more comfortable buying homes as-is. That does not mean they ignore major problems. Another scenario is a distressed property. This could mean fire damage, water intrusion, mold concerns, major foundation issues, or years of neglect.
