- **Coinflip:** A direct player-versus-player (PvP) video game mode where 2 users bet equal quantities of skins or credits. A virtual coin is turned, and the winner takes the entire pot.
- **Jackpot:** Multiple gamers pool their skins into a single pot. The higher the worth of the skins a user contributes, the higher their percentage chance of winning the entire collected pot.
