3. **Field-Tested (FEET):** Float 0.15-- 0.38. Visible wear and scratches, stabilizing affordability and visual fidelity.
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** Float 0.38-- 0.45. Significant paint chipping and heavy wear patterns.
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** Float 0.45-- 1.00. Heavily broken down, in some cases looking rusted, weathered, or nearly totally removed of paint.

Keep in mind: Certain skins-- such as the well-known AWP|Asiimov-- do not generate in Factory New condition, making their lowest possible wear states extremely uncommon and important.

How the Economy Works

- **Pro Player Usage:** If a popular esports expert starts using a specific skin throughout a significant competition, the need for that product normally surges over night.
