- **The Low Auto-Cashout:** Setting an automated cashout at a very low multiplier, such as 1.10 x or 1.20 x. This yields frequent small wins, however a single immediate crash (1.00 x) wipes out many collected earnings.
- **High-Risk Hunting:** Waiting for extended streaks of low multipliers in hopes of catching an enormous multiplier (e.g., 50x, 100x, or greater).

The Economics of CSGO Skins

To comprehend CSGO Crash, one must comprehend the value of CSGO skins. Initially presented in 2013 through the "Arms Deal" update, skins are cosmetic items that alter the appearance of weapons in the game.
