- **StatTrak™:** Items with this technology include an orange LED counter that tracks the variety of validated eliminates made with that particular weapon.
- **Memento Packages:** These are dropped during main Valve-sponsored esports tournaments (Majors) and function gold stickers representing the groups and MVP of the round.

The Rarity Tiers

Valve arranges CS2 skins into standardized rarity tiers, which determine how often they drop in-game or emerge from weapon cases.

1. **Customer Grade (White):** Common, basic drops.
