5. Check the box for **Disable fullscreen optimizations**.
6. Click **Apply** and after that **OK**.

4. Solving Third-Party Software Conflicts

Specific background applications regularly disrupt Valve's Anti-Cheat (VAC) and the video game client itself. Understood perpetrators include:

- Overlays (Discord, GeForce Experience, RivaTuner, MSI Afterburner)

Instant Desktop Crash on Startup	Out-of-date graphics drivers or corrupted configuration files.	Update GPU drivers, delete the cfg folder to reset settings, or re-install DirectX runtimes.
Video Game Freezes, Sound Loops, then Crashes	GPU motorist crash or unsteady hardware overclock.	Go back any factory or user overclocks on the GPU/CPU and perform a tidy setup of graphics drivers utilizing DDU (Display Driver Uninstaller).
DirectX Error/ "Device Hung"	GPU instability, overheating, or motorist timeout.	Lower graphics settings, cap the framerate (fps_max 300), and examine GPU cooling.

Advanced Troubleshooting: System-Level Fixes

If basic and intermediate steps [CS2Skin](#) fail, the concern might lie within the os or hardware configuration.

- **Perform a Clean Boot:** Temporarily disable all non-Microsoft services by means of msconfig to separate third-party software application disputes.
- **Run SFC and DISM Scans:** Corrupted Windows system files can trigger unforeseeable application crashes. Open Command Prompt as Administrator and run sfc/ scannow, followed by DISM/ Online/ Cleanup-Image/ RestoreHealth.
- **Test Hardware Stability:** Use software like Prime95 for CPU stability or FurMark for GPU stress testing to guarantee hardware isn't stopping working under load.
