

A town shaped by layers, not by a single moment

Commack does not announce itself with one grand historic square or a single famous skyline. Its character comes from layers. Older roads still trace the logic of farmland and early settlement. Postwar neighborhoods fill in the spaces between shopping corridors and preserved green pockets.
