Rarity Tier Product Classification Approximate Drop Probability **Blue** Mil-Spec Grade ~ 79.92% **Purple** Limited ~ 15.98% **Pink** Categorized ~ 3.20% **Red** Covert ~ 0.64% **Gold/ Special** Knives/ Gloves ~ 0.26%

(Note: Within each tier, there is an additional possibility that the item will drop in "StatTrak" condition, an unique feature that tracks the variety of kills made with that specific weapon.)

As the table plainly shows, the chances of pulling a high-tier item (Red or Gold) are exceptionally low. Statistically, the vast majority of case openings will lead to a Blue-tier item worth substantially less than the £ 2.50 cost of the secret.

The Economics of the Case Marketplace

The value of a CS: GO case and its contents is completely dictated by supply and need. Unlike conventional microtransactions where items have actually a repaired cost, the Steam Community Market works just like a genuine stock exchange.

Aspects Influencing Case and Skin Prices:
