

Mastic, NY has always been a place people tend to underestimate from the outside. On a map, it can look like a modest South Shore hamlet tucked between better-known Long Island names. Spend time here, though, and the place reveals a more layered story. Mastic sits where old road patterns, marshland edges, family neighborhoods, and the pull of the waterfront all meet.
