Gamers can trade ten weapon skins of the precise very same rarity tier for one weapon skin of the immediate next greater rarity tier, selected randomly from one of the collections represented in the traded items.



Finest Practices for Trade-Ups:

- **Check Float Values:** The wear condition (float) of the resulting skin is determined mathematically based on the typical floats of the ten input skins.
- **Control the Pool:** Try to utilize inputs from the very same collection to guarantee the output skin you prefer, instead of blending collections and leaving your result to pure possibility.

Tips and Best Practices for CS2 Openings
