Step-by-Step Guides for Common DIY Window Fixes

1. Replacing Worn Weatherstripping

Breezy windows are frequently the outcome of flattened or missing weatherstripping.

- **Action 3:** Cut the new weatherstripping (V-strip, foam tape, or felt) to size.

- **Action 1:** Put on heavy-duty work gloves and shatterproof glass. Carefully remove all broken glass shards from the frame.
- **Step 2:** Scrape away the old glazing putty and get rid of the metal sparkles holding the glass in place.
- **Step 3:** Measure the opening and cut a new piece of glass (or have a hardware shop sufficed) somewhat smaller sized than the opening.
- **Step 4:** Apply a fresh bed of glazing putty to the rabbet (the recess where the glass sits).
- **Step 5:** Press the glass firmly into the putty, secure it with new glazing points, and apply a bevel of putty around the exterior edge. Paint as soon as dry.
