- **Live roulette:** Similar to conventional casino live roulette, but normally simplified into 3 results (red, black, and green/zero), frequently themed around the rarity colors of CS: GO products.
- **Case Opening:** Sites simulate the video game's main case-opening mechanic, typically with tailored chances and higher-tier rewards than the base game.
- **Coinflip:** A direct player-versus-player (PvP) mode where two users bet equivalent amounts on a digital coin flip, with the winner taking the entire pot.
- **Prize:** Multiple players deposit skins into a main pot. A winner is drawn randomly; the greater the value of the skins deposited, the greater the statistical chance of winning.
- **Esports Betting:** Traditional sportsbooks incorporated into gambling sites, enabling users to bet skins or cash on professional CS2 matches (ESL, BLAST, Major competitions).

The Risks Associated with CS: GO Gambling

1. Regulatory Grey Areas and Legality

2. Absence of Transparency

3. Steam Account Security and Scams

Phishing links, malicious internet browser extensions, and fake gambling sites often target users' Steam credentials. If a player logs into a deceptive website mimicking a popular gambling platform, they risk losing their entire inventory to hackers. Additionally, Valve (the designer of CS) often punish gambling by banning API keys and bot accounts, which can result in users losing access to funds stored on these platforms.

4. Financial Risk and Addiction

Because the currency is initially seen as "virtual pixels" rather than real cash, gamers typically fall under the trap of costs much more than intended. The digital nature of skins makes it mentally much easier to place high-risk bets, possibly leading to financial distress.
