A virtual coin is turned, and the winner takes the whole pot. 50/50 odds, minus a small platform commission (rake). **Prize** Multiple gamers contribute skins to a central pot. Each skin's value identifies the player's "ticket" share. A

spinner selects one winner who takes whatever. Based on the total value contributed; platform takes a portion fee.

Functions of Modern CSGO Casinos
