Prize	Numerous players deposit skins into a communal pot. A spinner selects a winner based on the percentage	

of their contribution. Winner-take-all format where larger depositors have greater odds, but smaller sized depositors can still win.

The Technology Behind CS2 Casinos: Provably Fair Gaming

One of the primary concerns for users on third-party gambling sites is whether the video games are rigged. To combat hesitation, respectable CS2 casinos use a system called **Provably Fair**.

Provably fair algorithms allow gamers to independently verify the fairness of every bet, spin, or crash multiplier. This is generally accomplished through cryptographic hashing:
