If you are experiencing repeating crashes, overcome the following troubleshooting actions systematically.

1. Verify the Integrity of Game Files

With time, game files can become damaged due to unforeseen system shutdowns, incomplete updates, or defective storage drives. Steam has an integrated tool to check and replace missing or broken files.

- Open the **Steam Library**.
- Right-click on **CS: GO** and select **Properties**.
- Navigate to the **Local Files** tab.
- Click **Verify Integrity of Game Files**.
- Wait for the procedure to surface (Steam will automatically download any corrupted files), then restart your computer.

2. Update or Roll Back Graphics Drivers

- Discord Overlay
- NVIDIA GeForce Experience Overlay
- RivaTuner Statistics Server (RTSS) and MSI Afterburner

Advanced Troubleshooting

If basic fixes fail to resolve the problem, the problem might lie much deeper within your os or hardware configuration.

1. Handling Overclocks and XMP Profiles

While overclocking your CPU, GPU, or RAM offers an efficiency boost, CS: GO is notoriously sensitive to hardware instability.

- If you have actually applied an aggressive overclock, attempt dialing it back to standard factory specs.
- If you are running high-speed RAM, test disabling your motherboard's **XMP (Extreme Memory Profile)** or **DOCP** in the BIOS to see if memory instability is causing the crashes.

2. Reinstalling CS: GO Cleanly

- Uninstall CS: GO through Steam.
