Throughout the years, Valve has issued various cease-and-desist letters to prominent gambling operators, upgrading its Steam Subscriber Agreement to forbid commercial use of accounts and shutting down hundreds of automated trade bots.

Despite these efforts, operators frequently adjust by migrating to brand-new domains, utilizing decentralized payment approaches, or decoupling their platforms from direct Steam API logins, making total removal difficult. Moreover, numerous nationwide gambling commissions have inspected these sites for providing uncontrolled gambling access to minors, offered the young group of the Counter-Strike player base.
