Casino vs Online Casino Sites

It can be tempting to call every gambling website an “online casino,” but technically the term “casino” refers to the physical venue or its virtual equivalent offering a variety of gaming options. The UKGC treats them as venues (physical or online platforms) under the Gaming category.

Operators licensing their platform must comply with UKGC standards for gaming, which differ from those regulating betting or lotteries.

Lottery and Other Categories

Definition: *Lottery* means a form of gambling where players buy tickets or chances for a draw, with prizes awarded based on chance.



Besides traditional lottery draws, the category covers scratchcards, raffles, and prize competitions that meet certain legal criteria.

The UKGC defines lottery separately because it usually involves large numbers of players buying relatively inexpensive chances, with prizes randomly allocated.

Additional Categories Regulated by the UK Gambling Commission

- **Bingo:** Where players buy cards and mark numbers called out randomly
- **Arcade Machines:** Regulated if they award cash prizes
- **Remote Gambling:** All gambling conducted online or through apps

Why the UK Gambling Commission's Categories Matter

Using precise categories is far from mere legal pedantry; it directly affects:

1. **Licensing:** Operators must apply for the correct license(s). A bookmaker cannot run a casino without the appropriate gaming license.
2. **Consumer Protection:** Rules about fairness, advertising, and responsible gambling vary by category.
3. **Advertising:** Different gambling activities face distinct ad regulations—betting ads are not the same as online gaming promotions.
4. **Taxation and Reporting:** The commission reports statistics by category and sets tax rules accordingly.
