1. Lack of Regulation

Numerous operate out of jurisdictions with lax oversight, using little to no customer defense if a site unexpectedly shuts down or declines to pay payouts.

2. Rigged Odds and Transparency Issues

Unlike physical casinos or regulated online sportsbooks, third-party CS2 sites are not legally obliged to publish independently investigated Return-to-Player (RTP) portions. While lots of use "provably fair" cryptographic algorithms to prove results aren't modified mid-game, not all platforms adhere to these standards.

3. Steam Account Security

Logging into third-party sites using Steam OpenID opens users as much as potential phishing rip-offs, destructive web browser extensions, and API rip-off vulnerabilities. If jeopardized, a hacker can drain a user's entire inventory in seconds via automated trade bots.

4. Minor Gambling

- **Mass Ban Waves:** Periodically, Valve restricts hundreds of accounts associated with popular gambling bots, resulting in millions of dollars worth of digital possessions being permanently locked out of circulation.

In spite of these efforts, developers of gambling sites continuously adjust by shifting domain, presenting cryptocurrency alternatives, and using decentralized peer-to-peer trading systems to bypass Valve's restrictions.
