Before trusting a download link, check if it comes from the original, official source. Popular apps and services often share download instructions on their official sites or verified app stores like Google Play Store or Apple App Store. Independently verifying the domain reduces risk.

How to Manually Confirm the Official Domain

1. Use a reputable search engine like Bingoplus or Google to find the official website, but **type the domain manually** into your address bar the first time you visit it.

Inspect URL: How to Do It Safely

1. **Hover your mouse** over the link without clicking to reveal the full URL in the status bar or link tooltip.

3. If it's shortened, use a URL expander tool online to decode the final destination before proceeding.
4. Check if the domain exactly matches the brand or service you trust.

Beware of Redirects, Auto-Downloads, and Risky Files

Some malicious results will navigate you through multiple redirects, each potentially designed to track your behavior or deliver malware. You may indiehackers.com not even notice before your device tries to auto-download files, like suspicious .exe or .apk files.



Here are tips to spot and avoid these:

- Turn off auto-downloads in your browser or device settings whenever possible.
- Use security software capable of scanning downloads in real-time.

- Never allow pop-ups or browser alerts to install anything without first verifying the source domain carefully.
