

How to Determine It's a Cockroach Problem

If you believe a cockroach infestation at your Scarborough, ON apartment, the first step is confirming what you are actually seeing. Cockroaches are night-active and often stay hidden during the day, so many renters only notice subtle signs before they see a live insect. In a multi-unit building, that matters because early identification can accelerate pest control and reduce the chance of spread.

Check for **cockroach droppings**, which can resemble black pepper, coffee grounds, or tiny dark pellets depending on the species and the size of the infestation. You may also find **egg casings**, sometimes called **eggs/ootheca**, hidden in protected areas near food or warmth. Another common sign is **molted skins**, which cockroaches leave behind as they grow.

A key step is to **reduce moisture**. Cockroaches need water, and apartment environments often provide it through leaks, condensation, and standing water. Fix dripping taps if you can, dry sinks and tubs after use, and report leaks right away. Pay attention to **bathroom plumbing** and the area around toilets, sinks, and drains. Drying out these spaces is a key part of **moisture control**.

If possible, move clutter away from walls so that **baseboards** and floor edges are easier to inspect and treat. Cardboard boxes, paper piles, and unused bags can become convenient hiding places. The main goal is to reduce both food and shelter while you organize your next steps.



Why Cockroaches Move Fast in Multi-Unit Buildings
