- **Account Bans:** Valve consistently prohibits trade bots and personal accounts associated with business gambling operations.

In spite of these efforts, the industry adapts. Sites have moved towards accepting cryptocurrencies (Bitcoin, Ethereum, GBPT) or alternative payment processors along with-- or totally in place of-- direct skin trading, enabling them to prevent Steam's constraints.
