

Poway has always had a way of surprising people. On a map, it sits quietly inland in northern San Diego County, a little removed from the coastal sprawl and the tourist noise. Spend any time there, though, and the place reveals layers: old ranching roots, neighborhoods that grew carefully rather than chaotically, trail systems that still feel connected to the land, and a climate that can turn a simple afternoon into a test of patience if your cooling system is not up to the job.
