Very Little Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Really light wear, often just noticeable upon close assessment.
Field-Tested (FEET)	0.15-- 0.38	Visible scratches and use on popular edges, but the art work stays mostly undamaged.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Considerable wear, heavy scratching, and noticeable fading of colors.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Very used, rusted, or heavily faded. In some cases searched for for unique "black-grind" effects.
