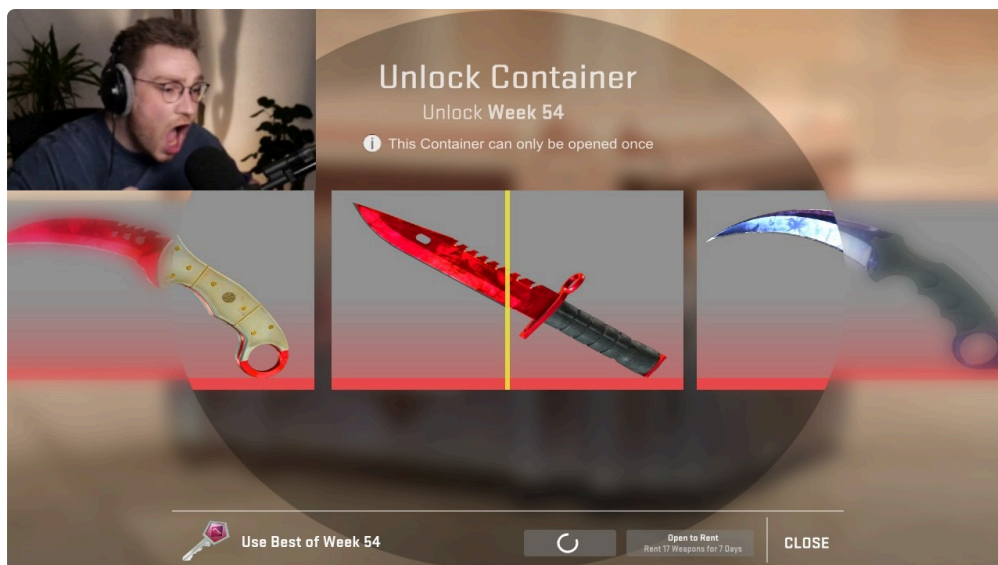


Rare CS: GO Cases: A Comprehensive Guide for Collectors and Investors
