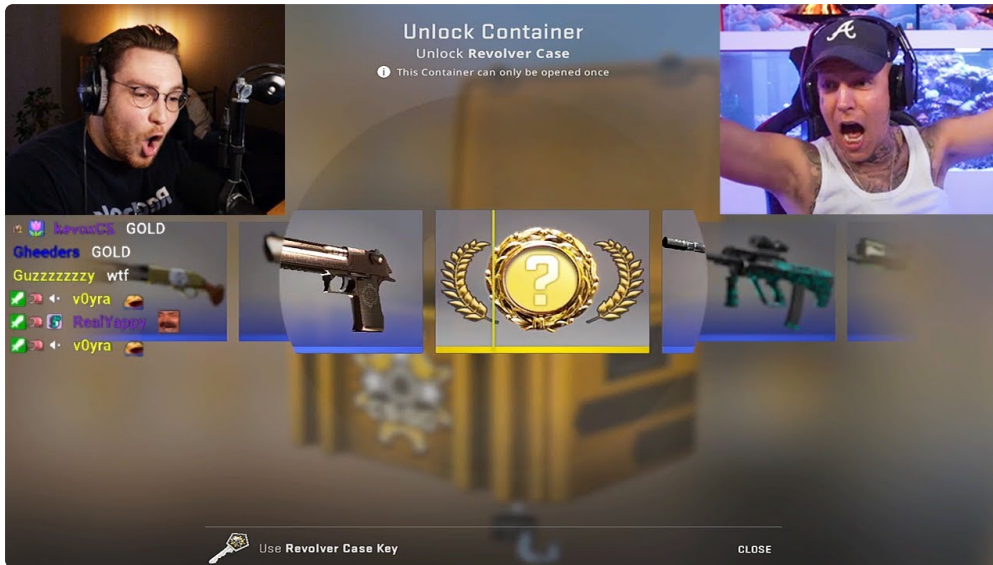
While case battles are eventually games of chance, experienced gamers use specific techniques to handle their bankroll and increase their total satisfaction.
