

Merrick has always felt like the kind of place that reveals itself slowly. You do not really understand it by driving through once on Sunrise Highway or by catching a quick errand on Merrick Avenue. You understand it by noticing how the streets settle into their own rhythm, how the houses keep a particular suburban dignity, and how the community seems to carry both memory and motion at the same time.
