If a skin is voted on by the community and approved by Facepunch, it gets contributed to the main Item Store for a limited time at a fixed base rate (usually ranging from £ 0.99 to £ 2.99).

Once gotten rid of from the official store, these items shift to the **Steam Community Market** and third-party trading sites, where supply and need determine their costs.

1. Camouflage (Biomes)

Wearing bright neon pink or radiant green armor in a thick forest or snowy tundra is a quick method to get spotted and removed. Competitive players typically curate loadouts based on the biome they live in:

- **Snow Biome:** Whiteout, Arctic, or pure white fabric skins minimize presence.
- **Forest Biome:** Woodland, camo, or earthy green and brown tones help gamers vanish into the treeline.
- **Desert Biome:** Tan, sand, and muted yellow versions provide the very best concealment amongst rocks and cacti.
