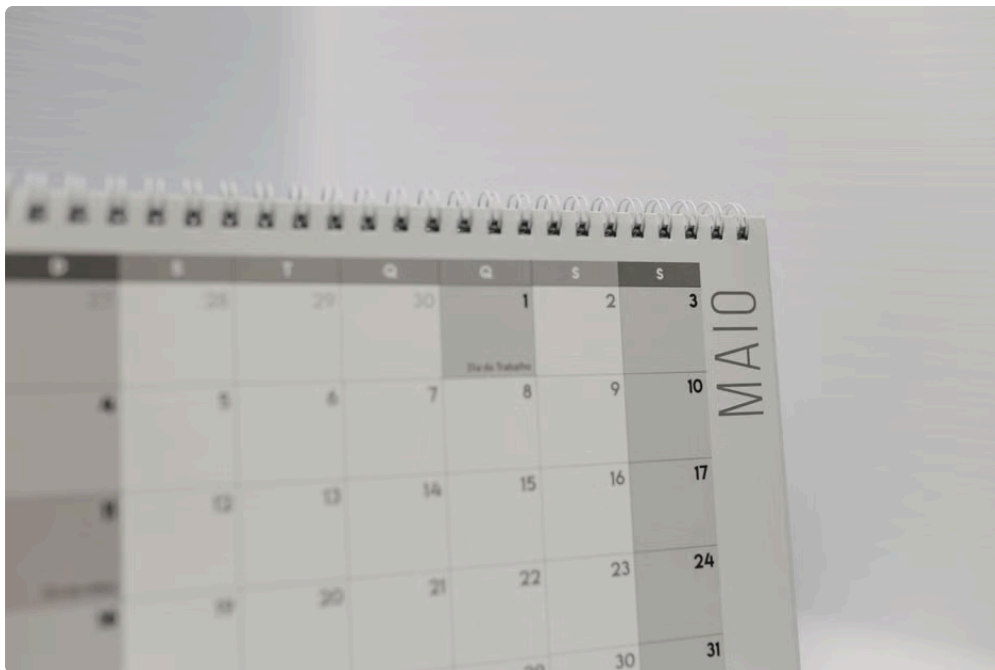
Onsego's \$99 Offering: All Four Subjects with 12 Months Access

Onsego is one prep platform that charges \$99 for access to all four GED subjects with 12 months' subscription wrapped in. On the surface, this is a strong offer.

Plan	Price	Access Length	Subjects Covered	Key Features Included
Standard Subscription	\$99	12 months	Math, Science, Social Studies, Reasoning Through Language Arts	Practice tests, quizzes, video lessons

Cost-per-month calculation: $\$99 \div 12 \text{ months} = \8.25 per month .

This is quite affordable compared to some platforms that charge \$30+ per month. But what about access to specialized prep tools like "Fast Mode" or a "Confidence Course"?



Does Onsego Include Fast Mode and Confidence Course?

According to their fine print and user reviews, Onsego's \$99 plan offers solid standard content but **does not include** the *Fast Mode* (a 30-day targeted pathway designed to accelerate learning) or the *Confidence Course* (key for test-day strategies and stress management). These tools typically require upgrading to a higher subscription tier costing \$149 or more.

This means if you want those features, your *actual cost per month* goes up, and your initial purchase might feel incomplete or restrictive.

Official GED Testing Service Alignment: Why “Official” Matters

One of the biggest marketing hooks GED prep companies use is the word “*official*.” But what does that really mean?

- **Official GED practice tests and study materials** come directly from the GED Testing Service — the organization that administers the test.
- “Official” materials closely mimic the real exam’s style, question types, and interface.
- Third-party courses often license some official content but may still lock crucial tools behind subscription tiers.

Choosing a prep platform that truly aligns with official GED content is essential. Otherwise, you risk studying with outdated or mismatched materials that don’t build the skills necessary for test success.

Beware of vague claims like “guaranteed pass” or “officially approved” without clear verification from GED Testing Service. These slogans are often marketing fluff and don’t correspond to actual exam alignment.

Self-Paced vs Live Classes for Busy Adults: What Works?
