Field-Tested (FEET)	0.15-- 0.38	Visible scratches and use, but the art work stays largely undamaged.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Substantial wear, heavy scratches, and noticeable paint fading.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Greatly distressed, rusted, or scraped; often looked for after for unique appearances.

Beyond exterior wear, skins can also have a **StatTrak™** module (which tracks validated kills with that specific weapon, marked by a little digital counter) or be designated as **Souvenirs** (dropped throughout official Valve-sponsored esports tournaments, featuring gold team and event stickers).

The Economics of the Steam Marketplace and Third-Party Sites

The CS2 economy operates similar to a real-world stock exchange. Rates are determined totally by supply and demand, rarity, and community perception.

Why Are Some Skins Worth Thousands of Dollars?

1. **Rarity:** Skins are classified by tiers (Consumer, Industrial, Mil-Spec, Restricted, Classified, Covert, and Special/Exceedingly Rare). The drop rates for high-tier items, particularly knives and gloves, are infinitesimally small.

2. **Trade-Ups:** Players can trade in 10 skins of a particular tier for one random skin of the next greater tier, burning valuable items in the procedure and reducing total supply.
3. **Pro Player Influence:** When a popular esports professional uses a specific skin during a significant tournament, the price of that skin typically surges over night.
4. **Float Extremes:** Some collectors pay enormous premiums for products with exceptionally low float worths (e.g., 0.000 x) or exceptionally high drifts where the weapon looks completely rusted away (referred to as "Blackiimovs" on the AWP Asiimov).

- **Steam Community Market:** Safest for casual users; deals use Steam Wallet funds.
- **Third-Party Marketplaces:** Platforms like Skinport, DMarket, and Buff permit users to purchase skins with fiat currency or cryptocurrencies, and frequently feature cash-out alternatives.
- **Peer-to-Peer (P2P) Trading Sites:** Sites where buyers and sellers trade directly without the bot holding the product for a necessary trade-hold period.
