

Tequesta is the kind of village people sometimes drive through without realizing how much is tucked into its quiet streets, waterfront edges, and small civic spaces. That is part of its appeal. It does not announce itself the way larger coastal destinations do, yet it rewards visitors who slow down and pay attention. Tequesta sits at the northern end of Palm Beach County, where the Loxahatchee River bends toward the Atlantic and everyday life still feels shaped by the water, the weather, and a strong sense of neighborhood identity.
